Dear readers,

As we mentioned in the last issue, as part of the innovations we are now implementing in the journal, we would like to return to the periodicity of two issues per year instead of the double issue that has gradually become common. The issues might therefore be less extensive, but the authors will publish their texts with a smaller time lag, which should not exceed one year. The contract of CASA with the Faculty of Philosophy of the University of Pardubice and the Faculty of Philosophy of the University of Hradec Králové is almost signed. Thus, the acquisition of the appropriate publication services will professionalize the process of publishing the journal to a greater extent.

In this issue, we present studies based on empirical data from Belarus (David Pergl) and Spain (Elena Soler). The peer-reviewed contributions we complement with a discussion initiated on the occasion of the book publication *Ernest Gellner's Legacy and Social Theory Today*. The authors of the individual chapters were invited and asked two questions, "Where does Gellner meet our needs and where not anymore?" and: "What kind of theory do we need in order to grasp the current epoch when Cyberia substitutes Industria?" The discussion was moderated by the book editor Petr Skalník and featured (in alphabetical order) Daniele Conversi, Thomas Hylland Eriksen, Guido Franzinetti, Chris Hann, Adam Horálek, Alan Macfarlane, David Shankland, and Zdeněk Uherek. The issue is complemented by three reviews.

The issue is dedicated to two important figures in Czech ethnology and anthropology who left us during this semester, František Vrhel and Mirjam Moravcová.
